Common Challenges



Difficulty understanding complex texts

Strategies to Overcome Challenges

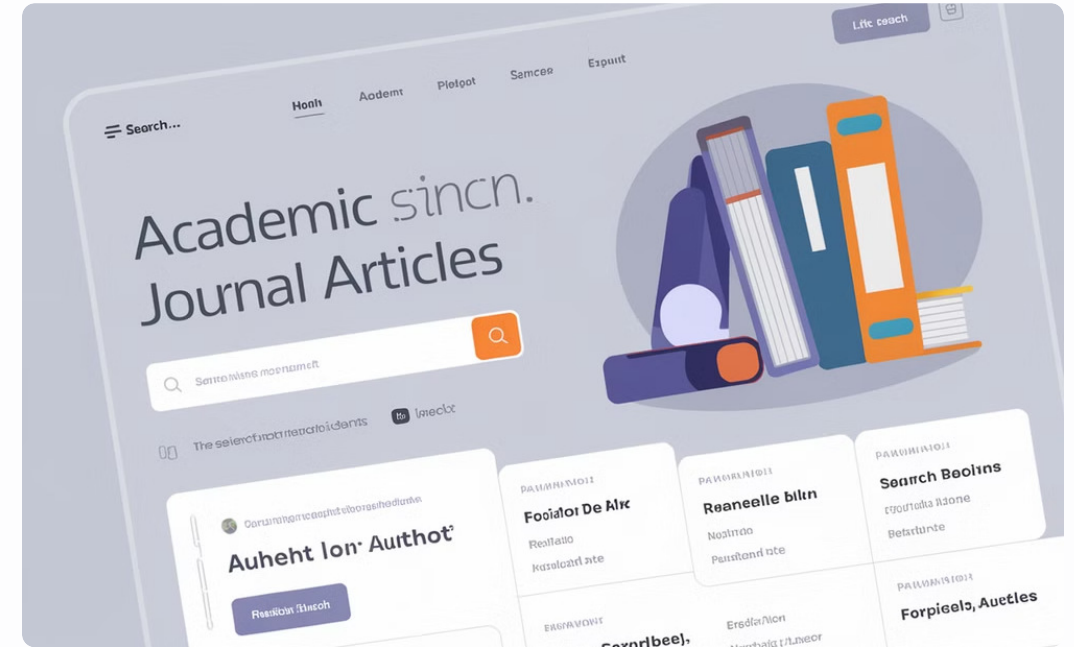
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Conducting literature reviews

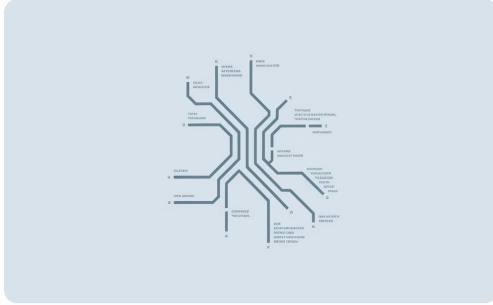

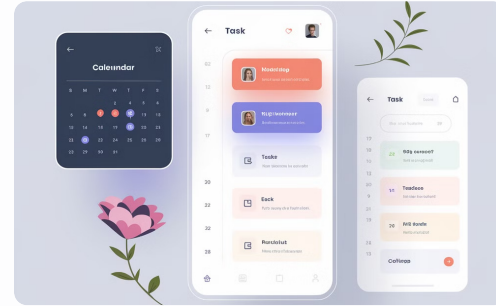

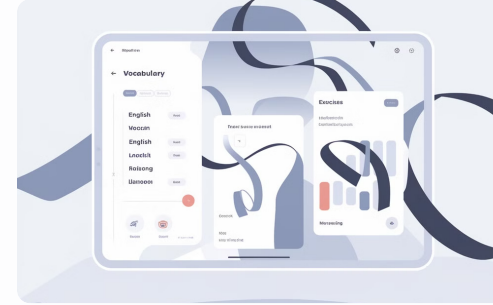
Mind Mapping Tools

Language Learning Tools

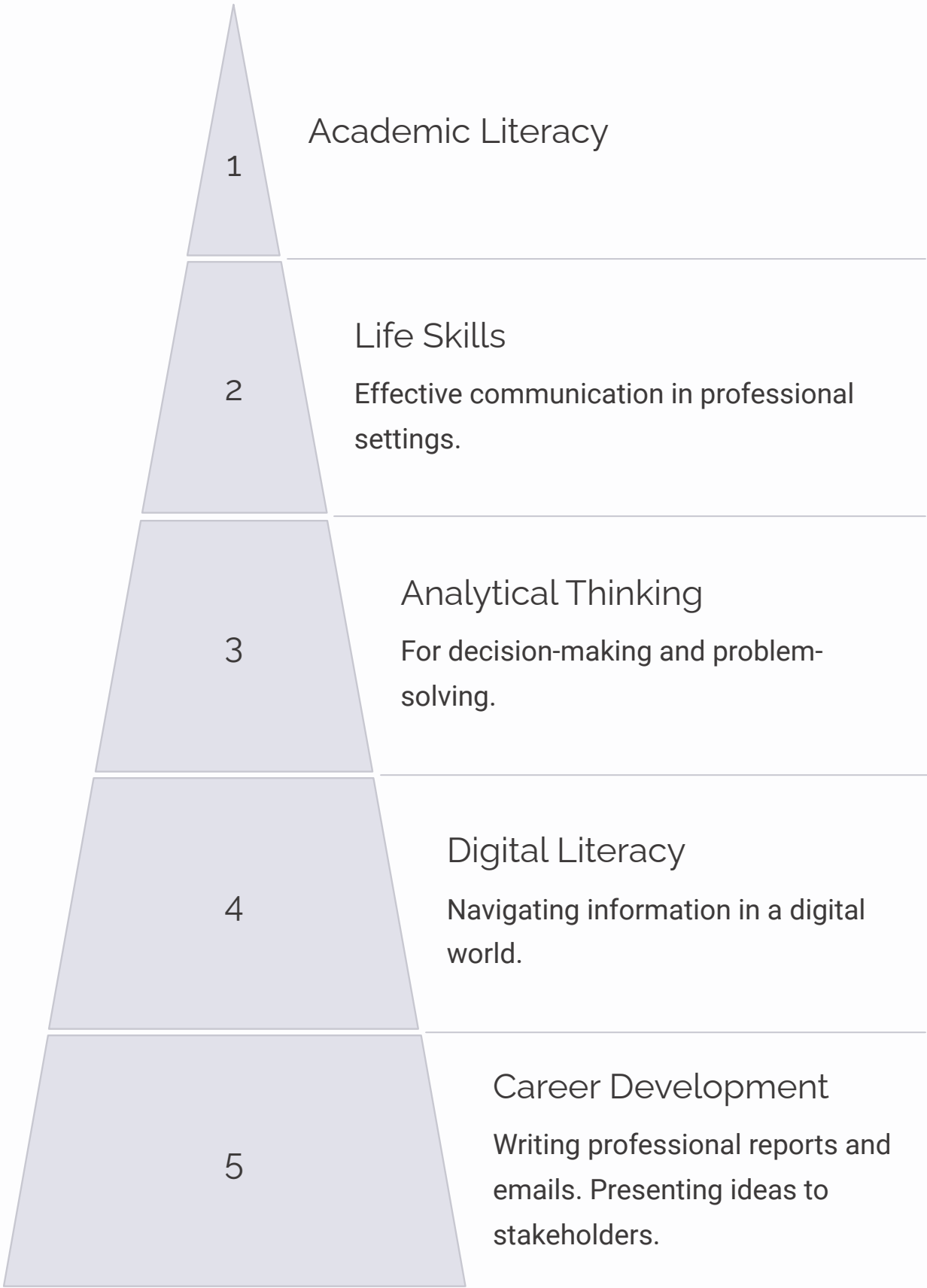
- **Duolingo:** For improving general language skills
